“The living room can't be a museum piece,” notes Giannakakis. “People should sit around feeling comfortable because they're surrounded by true craftsmanship.”

Handcrafted columns can help define a space, while coffered ceilings add depth. The living room is a place to implement cozy craftsman details such as precise millwork, built-in hardwood cabinetry, hand-carved mantels, and fireplaces encircled by custom tile, stone, or metal surrounds.

Above all, superior craftsmanship should anchor the living room and connect with its surroundings. “The space should feel like it's always been there,” says Howard Thies of Wooden Dreams in New Brighton.

Most floorplans in new and remodeled homes call for a kitchen that opens into the living/great room. As such, craftsmanship needs to be consistent throughout the entire space.
